## What are Y9 Options?



Year 9 options is an important milestone in your child's education.

By the end of Term 3, students will **choose the option subjects they wish to study from the start of Year 10**. They will select from a wide range of subjects that include both academic and vocational options.

**Students will receive guidance** from their subject teachers, form mentor, Head of Year, PSHE teacher and SLT to support their decisions.

### GCSE grading system

GCSEs are now awarded on a scale of 9 to 1.

- 9 is the highest grade
- Level 2 qualifications range from 4 – 9
- Level 1 qualifications from 1-3
- Students who do not achieve grade 4 or above in English and/or Maths are required to continue studying them in Key Stage 5.

The **Department for Education recommends these core subjects**, which make up the English Baccalaureate (EBacc), and help keep options for young people open.

#### The EBacc includes:

- 1. English language and English literature;
- 2. Maths
- 3. Combined Science

or

3 single sciences from Biology, Chemistry, Physics, and Computer science;

- 4. History or Geography
- 5. A language (either French or Spanish at HCC)







- The EBacc is not a qualification in its own right it's a combination of GCSE subjects, including a language, that offer an important range of knowledge and skills to young people.
- While your child may not have decided on their future career path yet, choosing the EBacc at GCSE gives them access to a full range of employment options when they leave secondary school and the broad knowledge that employers are looking for.
- If they are thinking of going to university, the EBacc is also recommended by Britain's most prestigious universities.
